Some good math apps are Slice It and Math Bingo. If you have an iPad at home these are good apps to go to. Kids like these apps because the games are very fun but are based on math, some kids don't realize they are learning about math, but they are! Slice It is a math app which is based on symmetry, fractions, and geometry. The app would give your child a shape to cut evenly. The app would see if it was the best answer and it would grade them one through five stars. The goal is to try to get all five stars on each shape. I recommend this app to 1st grade and above. I have been reading some really great Memoirs, mainly Patricia Polacco books, and want to recommend some of them. First off is: When I was Young in the Mountains by Cynthia Rylant. It is a wonderful book with a style of writing I don't see very often. On nearly every page, there are the same 7 words: When I was young in the mountains... Then she would list memories she experienced in the house she used to live in when she was little. This style is commonly called The List. As it's name suggests this style of Memoir is based on a list, pages filled with short paragraphs all linked by one aspect, such as a place or person.

The next book I would like to talk to you about is My Rotten Red Headed Brother by Patricia Polacco. This is a story that has a climax that stretches across the whole story-line. She picked a memorable topic to write about, and that is something you should always do when picking a plot for your next story. This plot takes the form of a mountain. The climax -or problem- can be split up into smaller climaxes but the biggest problem is always in the middle. You can use Patricia's books (another good one is Chicken Sunday) for a good idea on how to plot your books, with two or three small problems, each getting a little worse than the one before, and then the big main problem, after that you should have two or three actions that lead to the resolution, or solving of the problem. However that is just a simple story-line. My fifth grade teacher Mrs. English loves to use these books as a mentor text, and even though I'm in fifth grade and most work we do is way to advanced for younger kids, I find that the books listed above are appropriate for the younger grades too! These books are definitely entertaining enough for all ages to enjoy.
